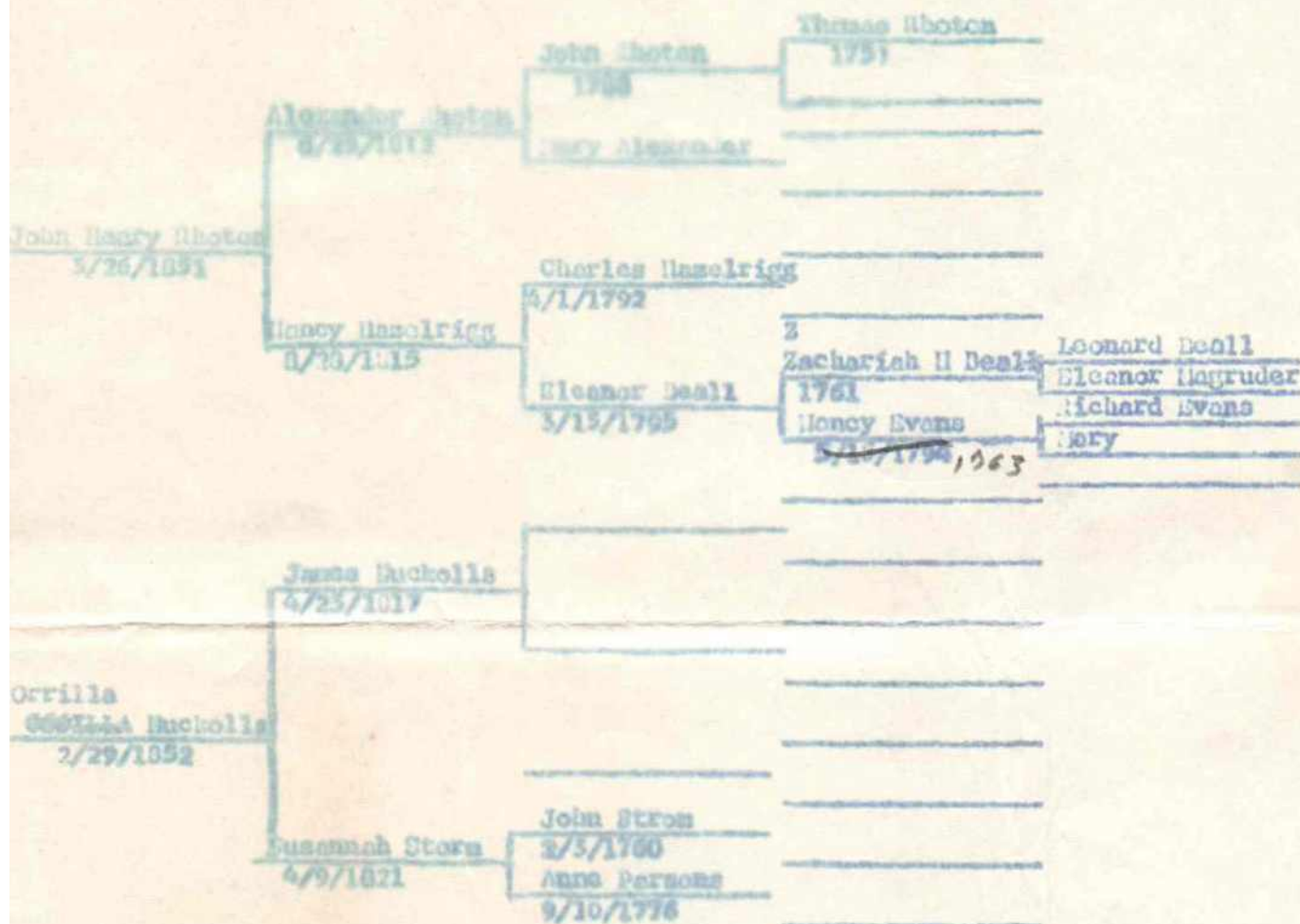

War of 1812  
Declaration for Pension

State of Kentucky, County of Clark SS  
On this 16<sup>th</sup> day of March A. D. One  
thousand eight hundred and seventy  
one, personally appeared before me  
William M. Beckner Presiding Judge  
of the County Court, a Court of record within  
and for the County and State aforesaid  
Leonard Beall aged seventy four  
years, a resident of Winchester  
district in County of Clark and  
State of Kentucky, who, being duly  
sworn according to law, declares  
that he was married, that his wife's  
name was Polly Young to  
whom he was married at the house  
of William Rankin in Clark County  
State of Kentucky, on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of October  
1819, and that she has since  
died, having departed this life on  
18<sup>th</sup> day of September 1862; that  
he served the full period of sixty  
days in the Military service of the United  
States in the War of 1812, that he is  
the identical Leonard Beall who  
enlisted as a substitute for Nathan  
Hulse who was drafted as a private  
in Captain Joseph Clark's Company  
of Colonel William Dudley's regiment

at Winchester Clark County State of  
Kentucky, on      day of March 1813,  
~~and was honorably discharged~~  
That he was captured in the  
battle of Hudleys defeat, that he  
surrendered with the survivors of  
his company, and was paroled by  
the British Commandant, at the  
mouth of Huron river on Lake  
Erie on      day of June 1813, and I  
then made my way to my home  
in Clark County State of Kentucky,

That afterwards he enlisted as  
a substitute for Joseph Cooper in Captain  
Robert Leber Company in Colonel  
Francisco's Regiment of Kentucky  
Militia on      day of March 1815  
and went as far as Havana in  
the State of Ohio, and news of  
peace being received, he was  
with the balance of his company  
honorably discharged on      day  
of April 1815. That when he

them aid or comfort; or exercised the functions of  
any office whatever under any authority, or pretended  
authority, in hostility to the United States, and that he  
will support the Constitution of the United States, that  
he is not in receipt of a pension under any previous  
act; that he makes this declaration for the purpose of  
being placed on the pension roll of the United States  
under the provision of the act approved February  
14. 1871. and he hereby constitutes and appoints  
James Hagan, with full power of substitution  
and revocation James Hagan of Winchester  
Kentucky, his true and lawful attorney to prosecute  
his claim and obtain the pension certificate that may  
be issued; that his post office is at Winchester  
County of Clark State of Kentucky, that his  
domicile or place of abode is two miles east of  
Winchester, the county town of Clark County in State of  
Kentucky, on the main road to Irvine Estill County  
Kentucky.


State of Kentucky Clark County 1st

On this 9<sup>th</sup> day of December 1850, personally appeared before me a Justice of the Peace in and for Clark County & State of Kentucky, Leonard Beall aged 54 years a resident of Clark County in the State of Kentucky, who being duly sworn according to Law, declared that he is the identical Leonard Beall who was a private in the Company Commanded by Capt Joseph Clark in the Regiment of Kentucky Militia commanded by Col William Dudley in the War with Great Britain declared by the United States in June 1812. That he volunteered in Clark County Kentucky on or about the day of March 1813 (rendezvoused at Lexington about 27<sup>th</sup> March 1813) for 6 months, he continued in actual service in said War until 5<sup>th</sup> May 1813, when he was taken prisoner at Dudleys defeat - He continued a prisoner with the Indians about one month, was taken by them to Malden, Canada, and placed by the British on the vessel Lucien Charlotte and landed at the Mouth of Heron River where he was paroled not to serve until exchanged, ~~or~~ that he is not certain that he was ever regularly exchanged - that he returned home to Clark County in July 1813, and was paid off by Paymaster Chas Carr at Georgetown Ky - - That he is also the identical Leonard Beall who was a private in the Company Commanded by Capt Robert Scobee in the Regt of Kentucky Militia commanded by Col John Francis in the same War as aforesaid; that he volunteered at Winchester in Kentucky about fall 1814, rendezvoused with his Company at Georgetown Kentucky about 8<sup>th</sup> February 1815 & marched to Urbanna where he was honorably discharged on or about 25<sup>th</sup> March 1815 by reason of the Close of the War, that he volunteered for six months & continued in actual service in said last mentioned Campaign about 45 days - He refers to the Muster Rolls of said Clark & Scobee's Companies for the evidence of his service, never having received any written


discharge from Clark's Company, and his discharge  
from the other Company being lost.

He makes this declaration for the purpose of ob-  
taining the Bounty land to which he may be entitled  
under the act granting Bounty land to Officers and  
Soldiers who have been engaged in the Military service  
of the United States, passed September 28th 1850.

The Commissioners will please send my land warrant  
& communications in relation thereto, to A. H. Buck-  
ner, Winchester Ky.

On this 6<sup>th</sup> day of April A D 1855, personally appeared before me, Benjamin Kerr, a Justice of the Peace, duly authorized to administer oaths within and for the County and State aforesaid, Leonard Beall, aged 58 years, a resident of Clark County in the State of Kentucky, who being duly sworn according to law, declares that he is the identical Leonard Beall, who was a private in the Company commanded by Captain Robert Seaboard in the Regiment of detached Militia commanded by - footman Col John Francis co United States in June 1812 that he entered the Service at Georgetown Ky, on or about the 8<sup>th</sup> of February A. D. 1805 for the term of six months and continued in actual service in said war for fourteen days, and was honorably discharged at Urbana Ohio on or about the 27<sup>th</sup> day of March A. D. 1815 that he has heretofore made application for bounty land under the act of September 28th, 1850, and received a land warrant, No. not recollecte, for Eighty acres, which he has since legally disposed of, and can not now return. He was also a private in Capt Joseph Clark's Company Kentucky Vol at Bardsley's defeat. He makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the additional bounty land to which he may be entitled under the act approved the 3d day of March, 1855. He also declares that he has never applied for nor received, under this or any other act of Congress, any bounty land warrant except the one above mentioned. He refers to his personal application for proof of service in both Companies. A H Buckner Winchester Ky is my agent prosecuting this claim.

We, John Catherwood and Benjamin F. Buckner, residents of Clark County, in the State of Kentucky, upon our oaths, declare that the foregoing declaration was signed and acknowledged by Leonard Beall, in our presence, and that we believe, from the appearance and statements of the applicant, that he is the identical person he represents himself to be.
