CHAPTER IX.

THE BUSH FAMILY.

The Bush family, of Clark county, Kentucky, is said to have descended from John Bush, who came from England and settled at Kiccoughtan (now Hampton), Virginia, in the year 1618, and while there is probably no doubt whatever of this being a fact, still, on account of the destruction of many old records in Virginia, it has not been found possible to trace the connection.

The furthest back the Clark county Bushes have been absolutely traced is to John Bush, of St. Thomas Parish, Orange county, Virginia, whose will was probated in that county in 1746. (See Appendix, VIII, 19.) In this will his wife is mentioned as Bridget Bush, and the following children are enumerated: (1) Philip; (2) Martha Bruce; (3) Elizabeth Sanders; (4) John; (5) Thomas; (6) Daniel. The testator, John Bush, was probably born not later than 1670, and was doubtless the grandson of the pioneer John Bush who settled at Kiccoughtan in 1618. In this connection the following note from the Virginia Magazine of History and Biography (Vol. I, page 194) may be of interest:

"John Bush, of Kiccoughtan, in the Corporation of Elizabeth City, Gentleman, who came over in the Neptune, at his own charge, in 1618, was patented 300 acres; 50 in his own right, 150 for the transportation out of England of his wife, Elizabeth, and his children, Elizabeth and Mary Bush, who all came in the Guift, in 1619; and 100 acres for the transportation of his two servants, Thomas Hand and William Pucker, who came in the Charles in 1621, said land being in the parish of Kiccoughtan and adjoining the lands of Lieutenant Albino Lupo and William Julian and bordering on the main river. Granted by Wyatt in 1624."

The Family Lineage is organized using a coding system starting with a value of 1 for the head of the family (Alexander Lane) and adding a digit for each new generation, in order of birth. Robert Ridley Lane was the 4th son of A. Lane's 9th son and has a code of 194. Spouses have a letter added; thus R.R. Lane's wife, Mary Jane Bradfield, has a code of 194A. Second marriages use B, etc. Where there were more than 9 children, use the appropriate letter: z=10, y=11, etc. The children of second marriages have the B ahead of the child's number. Spouses use upper and lower case, and direct family members are recorded using ALL CAPITALS.

Col Burrus comes from a family prominent in the Colonial and Revolutionary period, his ancestor, Thomas Burrus, having been a native of Scotland who settled in Orange County, Virginia and served as a Colonel in the War for Independence. He married Mary Tandy, who was descended from a noble family of England and their son Thomas married Sarah Stevens, a niece of General Stevens of Revolutionary distinction. Thomas Burrus (2nd) was a Captain in his father's regime during the Revolution, and with his family removed from Virginia to Clark County, Kentucky where he became a large landholder. His sons were: Thomas, Roger, Tandy, Peter and William S., of whom Peter served through the War of 1812 and was in several battles. William Perkin Burrus, brother of Col. Burrus of Buffalo served in the Mexican War until his regiment was disbanded in the City of Mexico. He then returned to Kentucky, where he engaged in farming for the rest of his life. William S. Burrus married Philadelphia Perkin, a daughter of William Perkin of Fairfax, Virginia a Mrs Burrus being descended on her mother's side from Captain Horton, a veteran of the Revolution. Buckley of Lexington, Ky., the writer has been given a copy of the will of Frances which shows that she accompanied some of her children to Ky. and d. 1816. The writer is glad to make this correction. Sally, ² dan. of Thos. Burruss and Frances Tandy m. Rev. Andrew Tribble b. in Caroline Co., Mar. 1741, (son of George Tribble and Betty Clark) d. in Clark Co. Ky., Dec. 22, 1822. Mrs. Buckley has given the following Bible record of Rev. Andrew Tribble. Roger, ³ youngest son of Thos. Burruss and Frances Tandy m. Cynthia Mills, and to the kindness of Miss Elma Hands of Quincey Ill. we are indebted for their Bible record given herewith.

Will of Frances Burruss

In the name of God amen. I, Frances Burrus of the State of Kentucky and county of Christian, being in perfect senses, and not knowing when it shall please almighty God to call me hence—do hereby make and ordain this my last will and testament.

First, I desire after my decease that my three sons, Thomas Burrus, William T. Burrus and Roger Burrus be paid by my executors, hereafter named, the sum of four hundred dollars to be equally divided between them if Frank (a negro who is now run away) should not be got again before my decease.

Secondly, I desire the sum of twenty pounds current money be paid to my son-in-law Andrew Tribble to him and his heirs forever.

Thirdly, I desire that the balance of my money which is sixty pounds be equally divided between my two daughters Sally Tribble and Frances T. Bush, to them and their heirs forever.

Fourthly, I give and bequeath to my Grand daughter Sally Ellen Burrus, daughter of my son Roger Burrus, one feather bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever.

Fifthly, I give and bequeath to Joseph Mills Burruss the son of Nathaniel Burrus one feather bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever.

Lastly, I appoint my friends William Tandy and Nathaniel Burrus my executors to this my last will and testament, revoking all others.

In witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty-fifth day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixteen.

PATRICK HENRY BI-CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION.

Citizens of Virginia and the nation will gather at Hanover Court House on July 15, 16 and 17 to join in celebrating the bi-centennial of the birth of Patrick Henry, Orator of the American Revolution and first Governor of Virginia, who was born at "Studley", Hanover County, May 29, 1736.

The feature of the celebration will be a spectacular pageant-drama with a cast of over 1,000 depicting the life and times of Patrick Henry. A stadium to seat 10,000 has been erected in a natural amphitheatre near the Court House and historical pilgrimages, home-coming day, and public addresses will round out the three day program.

The celebration is sponsored by the Patrick Henry Bi-Centennial, Inc., a non-profit group headed by State Senator Henry T. Wickham. Other officers are Dr. R. E. Blackwell, president of Randolph-Macon College; Hon. Rosewell Page, of "Oakland"; George E. Haw, Stuart A. Oliver and Paul F. Watkins.

Culpeper County, Virginia, Deed Book R, Page 319-

3 April 1792 - James Hickman Senior, living in KENTUCKY, of one part and John Minor of CULPEPER COUNTY, VIRGINIA, of the other part - Whereas the said James Hickman Sr., before he moved to Kentucky did appoint James Hickman Jr. and William Roberts of Culpeper County his true and lawful attorneys. (Note by C.H.H.): See Culpeper Deed Book O, page 309) to sell and convey land belonging to him; therefore sell 48 acres of land to said John Minor, etc. - Recorded 17 September 1792.

COMMENT: The above James Hickman Senior was devised land in Culpeper County by will of his father, Edwin Hickman of Albemarle County, Virginia, dated 4 February 1758, probated November Court 1769 (Will Book 2, Page 248) A James Hickman is on 1790 Kentucky Census in Fayette County.

Letter from Frances (Tandy) Burrus to her son William T. Burrus, brother of Elizabeth (Burrus) Brockman.

Christian Co., Ky. 23 Jany, 1816

My dear son: Altho it is very pleasing to me to receive letters from you, yet I must acknowledge that the contents of yours of the 15th Oct. last gave me great concern. You state there "was an application made for Peter to come to Ky. but not by me." It was by my request, and my reason is this; I learn that he has become so dishonest that he will steal for a mere trifle and it gave me uneasiness to think I had raised such a negroe. I therefore felt a desire to have him here with me-- You wrote to me about a bond. I can't recollect any thing about it. I am very sorry to hurt your feelings. It is not my intention to hurt the feelings of any mortal if I know it-- If you allude to the bond which I hold against my son Roger I can tell you that Cousin William Tandy has it, and further, I can assure you that I deposited it with him soon after I came to Ky. and with the interest of that money I buy my clothes--

I have no doubt but you have heard of the death of my two grandsons, Roger and Charles Burrus, Their father left no means untried for their recovery, he had four phisicians with them but all to no purpose.--

I shall conclude my son by informing you that my time here is not long, Therefore it is my great desire to be prepared so that I may with joy obey the summons of my Lord and Master, and oh, how greatly do I desire that you may bear in mind that one thing is needful and if indeed we are in possession of that great and inestimable pearl we need not be greatly solicitous about other matters-- Through the mercies of a kind and indulgent God I yet am in a tolerable state of health. The sores on my face are at this time worse than common. I am getting blinder and deafer than I was a year or two past.-- Give my best love to Patsey and the children and accept it yourself, also to all my cousins and friends.

This is an interesting affidavit of Rebecca Brockman in settlement of a family argument which arose over use of a horse and wagon, which apparently was amicably settled.

The affidavit of Mrs. Rebecca Brockman, taken at her dwelling house in the County of Orange to be read as evidence in Orange Court in a matter of controversy wherein William Brockman is plaintiff and Thos., Jacob, Asa and Oswald Brockman are defendants; This deponant sayeth some time previous to this I lent my son John Brockman my waggon tho I had given the management of my business to my son William Brockman. Some time after how long I do not recollect there were two of my grandsons at my house and I saw my son William knocked down but I know not by whom. Taken this 23rd day of January in the year of our lord 1813.

Question by Thos. Brockman, one of the defendants: did you see Asa Brockman strike you son Wm. Brockman?

Answer: He was knocked down between them.

WILL OF THOMAS BURRUS (WIFE FRANCES TANDY)
father of Elizabeth Brockman believed to be
wife of John Brockman Oct. 2, 1788

In the name of God, amen-- I, Thomas Burrus, of the County of Orange and parish of St. Thomas, being sound in mind and memory--I think God for the same and do hereby certify this to be my last will and testament in manner and form as follows:

First, after I quit this mortal life I desire my body to be decently buried with ye solemnity at the discretion of my executors and after paying my just debts what then remains my will and desire is may be disposed of in the following manner.

I leave to my beloved wife Francis Burrus my estate, real and personal, during her natural life or widowhood and after her death to be divided amongst my children here after named--

I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Burrus five hundred acres of land in Kentucky (first choice) to him and his heirs, etc.

I also give and bequeath to my son Wm. Tandy Burrus five hundred acres of land in Kentucky (second choice) to him, his heirs, etc. as also one feather bed and furniture, etc.

Also I give and bequeath to my son Roger Burrus five hundred acres of land at Kentucky (third choice) to him and his heirs, etc. as also one feather bed, furniture, etc.

Also I give and bequeath to my grandson Thomas Burrus, son of Thomas Burrus, one negro boy Absalom to him and his heirs, etc.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Morning Burrus one negro woman named Nan and all her increase, but if this negro should die before my daughter shall be of age or marry, then there shall be a likely girl, not under the age of ten years old be replaced to her and her heirs, etc. and also one beast by the name of Jack and one saddle and one feather bed, furniture.

Also I give and bequeath to my daughter Fanny Embrey one negro girl named Sukey and all her increase to her and her heirs, it being her part of the slaves. I intend also for her one feather bed and furniture, which said negro and bed is already delivered to her.

Also I give and bequeath to my daughter Mildred Embry one negro boy named Ben to her and her heirs, this being already delivered. Also ten lbs. cash already delivered.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Brockman one negro boy named Duke, also one feather bed and furniture which said negro and bed is already delivered, also twenty lbs. cash to be raised out of my estate to be hers and her heirs, etc.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Sarah Tribble one negro girl named Agnes and all her increase to her and her heirs already delivered, also one feather bed and furniture already delivered.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Jane Quisenberry one negro girl named Dinah and all her increase, to her and her heirs, also one feather bed and furniture, also twenty lbs. cash which portion above mentioned is already delivered.

I give to my granddaughter Francis Quisenberry, the daughter of Jane Quisenberry, one negro girl named Violet, to her and her heirs forever.

I give to my daughter Francis Tandy Bush one negro girl named Alice and all her increase, also one feather bed and furniture to her and her heirs, which is already delivered to her.

I desire after my wife Francis Burrus death or widowhood that the negro boy Gilbert, now in possession of my son Thomas Burrus, may be returned to the balance of my estate and that there be nine of the choicest of my slaves then remaining to be equally divided between my three sons, Thomas Burrus, William Tandy Burrus and Roger Burrus, to them and their heirs, etc. and if either of my sons should die under age or before they possess their part of my estate, that their portion shall then be equally divided between those surviving. I also desire that the balance of my land at Kentucky, which is five hundred acres, be equally divided between my five daughters, Fanny Embry, Mildred Embry, Sally Tribble, Jane Quisenberry and Francis Tandy Bush to them and their heirs forever. To Morning Burrus the land where on I now live at the death of my wife Francis Burrus, to her and her heirs forever, also my will and desire is after the death or widowhood of my wife Francis Burrus that the balance of my negroes then remaining, with stock and household furniture of all kinds then remaining may be equally divided amongst my sons and daughters above named except one equal child's part of the last balance of negroes and household furniture and stock be equally divided amongst my two grand daughters and grandsons, Elijah Berry, Dicey Berry and Harry Berry to them and their heirs forever, and I do hereby nominate and appoint my wife Francis Burrus executrix and Henry Tandy and Thomas Burrus executors of this my last will and testament as witness where of I have here to set my hand and seal this second day of October, one thousand seven hundred and eighty eight.

There in named and proved by the oaths of Caleb Lindsay, Thomas Bell and James Daniel witnesses on motion of the said executors who made oath according to said certificate is guaranteed them for obtaining probate thereof in due form where upon they with Joseph Duncan and William Tandy Burrus their securities entered into and acknowledged their bond for the same in the sum of ten thousand pounds current money.

In the name of God Amen the twentieth day of March Anno Domini 1742 I Jacob Burroughs of the parish of Saint Margaret's and County of Caroline being well in Body and of perfect memory thanks be to Almighty God for it and calling to remembrance the uncertainty of this life and that all flesh must yield to death when it shall please God to call, do make and declare this my last will and testament in manner and form following. First being penitent and sorry for all my sins most humbly desiring forgiveness for the same, I commend my soul to Almighty God, my Saviour and Redeemer In whom and by whose merits I trust and believe assuredly to be saved and to have full remission and forgiveness of all my sins and to inherit the Kingdom of Heaven and my body I commit to the earth to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors hereafter named and for the settling of my temporal estate and such goods, chattels, debts and such as pleased God to bestow upon me, I do order, give and bestow them in manner and form following. Imprimus I give and bequeath to my dearly beloved wife Mary one third of all my estate real and personal with the plantation whereon I now live in Caroline County during her natural life and after her Decease to my son Charles and his heirs and in case of his dying in nonage to my son William and his heirs. Item I give to my well beloved son William twenty five pounds current money to be raised out of my estate as also one bed with furniture a cow and yearling and two Ewes. Item I give to my beloved son Jacob one young Mare. Item I give to my beloved son Thomas two hundred seventy three acres of land being part of four hundred acres granted to me by letters patent bearing date the fifteenth of March 1735 lying on the north side of Hicory Creek in Hanover County to him and his heirs and in case of his dying childless to be equally divided among his four brothers above mentioned or the survivors of them, as also one Feather bed a cow and yearling and two Ewes. Item I give to my son Charles besides the Plantation whereon I now live after my wife's decease a feather bed and furniture a cow and yearling and two Ewes one Iron Pot two Puter dishes with six puter plates. Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth one feather bed with furniture a cow and yearling and two Ewes, two puter dishes and a bason and as for the rest of my estate that is not here bequeathed nor given I give and bequeath to my daughters Ann, Justiniana and Mary to be equally divided amongst them and thereby make and appoint my beloved wife Mary and my beloved son William Executors of this my last will and testament; hereby revoking, disannulling and making void all former wills by me made and declaring this only to be my last will and Testament. In Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and date above mentioned/ The 24th line being underlined the word (forever) being raised in the 21st, 22nd, and 30th lines.
