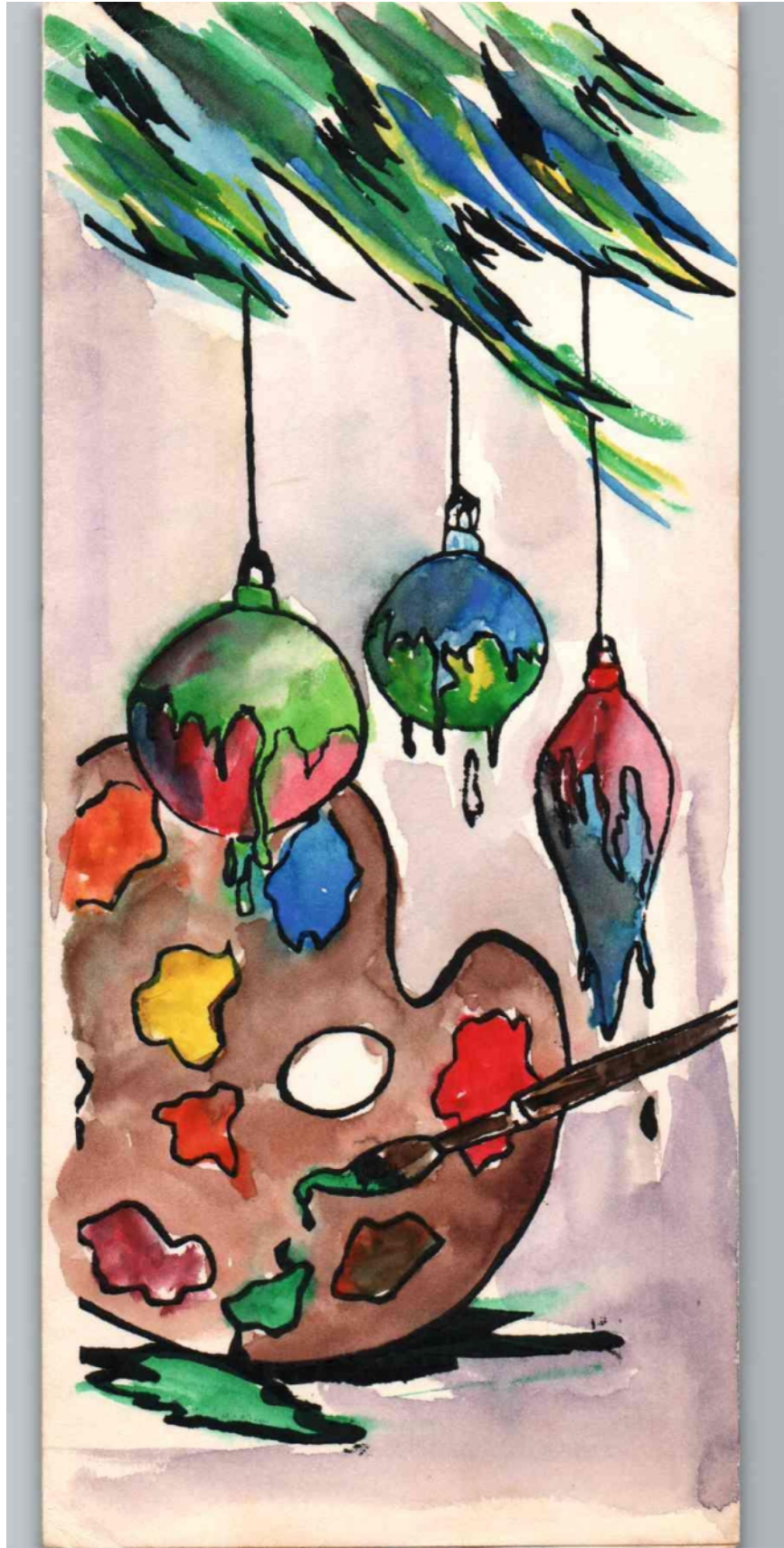

FERRILL, PETER.

August 17, 1822--February Court, 1829.

To wife Jane, land of which he shall die possessed and balance of estate during her natural life and after her death to be divided as follows: To Martilla and Peter, infant children of his son James, deceased, that part of his land called the Wiry (?) tract, 100 acres, except a certain boundary described; to son Thomas and daughter Annis Hanks, balance of land. Balance of estate to be divided into four equal shares, one to Sally Williams, wife of George Williams, one to Annis Hanks, one to Thomas Ferrill, and the other to his grandchildren Martilla and Peter Ferrill.

Executors: None named.

Witnesses: Samuel Hanson, William W. Flanigan.

FIELD, ZACHARIAS.

April 4, 1837--January 28, 1839.

Aged and infirm in body. All money and property of every description heretofore advanced to his son William S. and son-in-law Robert E. Martin and Elizabeth his wife, including two slaves given specially to his daughter Elizabeth and her children, to be considered equal and no account taken. To daughter Elizabeth and her children as a special legacy, negro boy.

Tract of land "whercon I live," 256 acres, to son-in-law Robert E. Martin and his daughter Elizabeth, valued at \$14,000, and for purpose of equalizing estate between his children, said Robert is to pay to son William G., \$7,000.

Balance of estate to be equally divided between his two children. Slaves and other property exclusive of notes and bonds not disposed of to be valued by John Grigsby, Edmund H. Diddle and John Yoidell or any two of them, and if his son-in-law Robert E. Martin chooses he is to have the same by paying to son William one-half of the value thereof, and should he not elect to take property, then to be sold and equally divided between his two children. Property and money devised to son William S. to be delivered to Joseph H. Williams, who is appointed trustee.

Executor: Samuel M. Taylor.

Witnesses: Caleb Capps, John Grigsby.

Codicil, December 25, 1838. Should son-in-law Robert E. Martin and daughter Elizabeth find it inconvenient to manage any of slaves specifically devised to them they shall be at liberty to sell them and loan out the money for benefit of daughter Elizabeth and her children or may purchase other negroes, and at death of daughter Elizabeth such negroes that remain unsold and the money from the sale to be equally divided between the children of daughter Elizabeth.

Samuel M. Taylor waived all rights as executor.

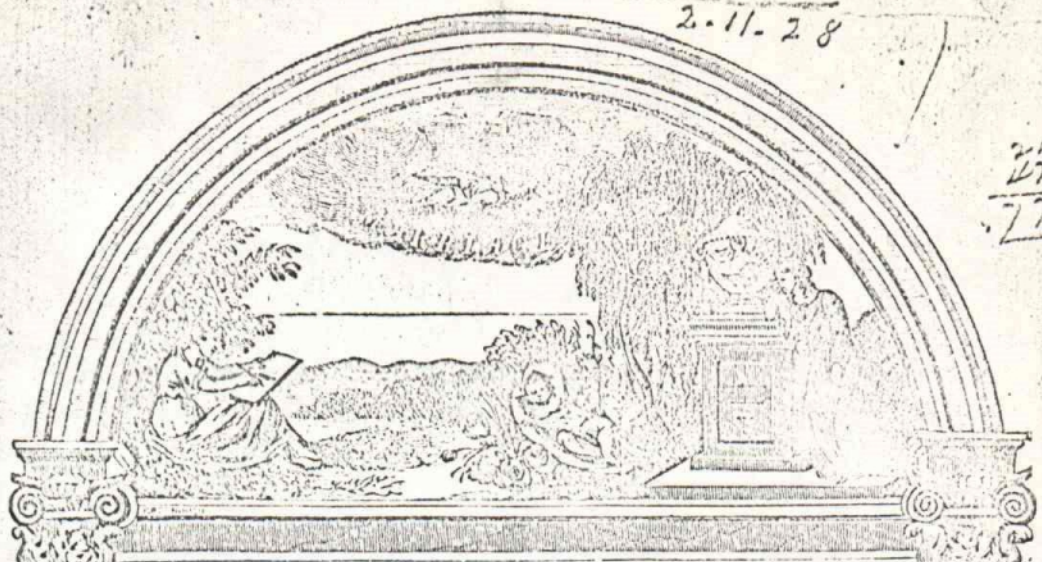

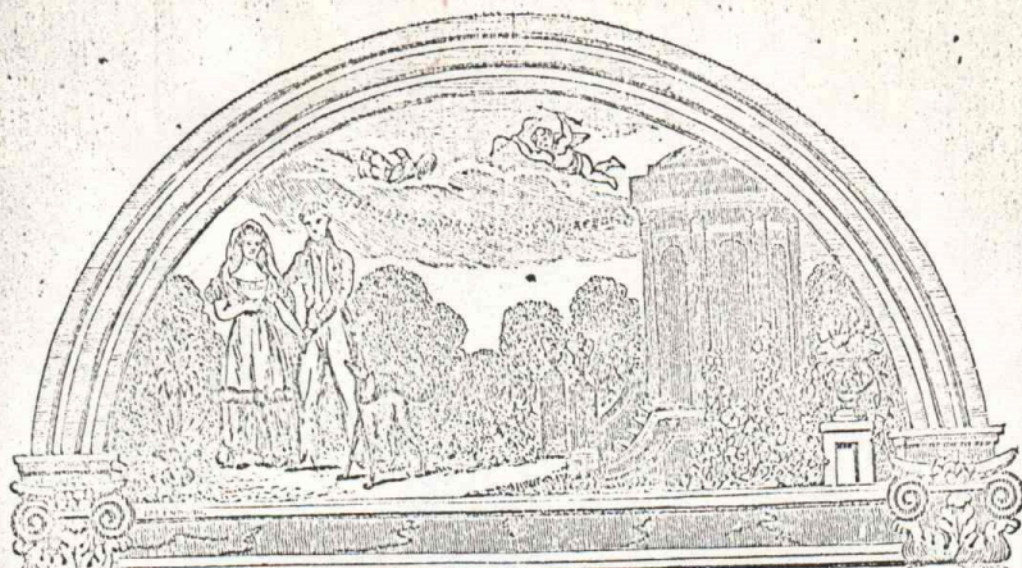

THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY,

Clarke County, Oct.

On this 4<sup>th</sup> day of October 1818, before me the subscriber, one of the Judges of the Circuit Court, in and for the state aforesaid, personally appeared John Martin aged fifty seven years; who being by me first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath, make the following statement and declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late law of Congress entitled, "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary war;" that he is a citizen of the state of Kentucky, and resident in the county of Clarke; and that he was enlisted for three years in Campusta County in the state of Virginia on or about the fall of the day of year 1776 by one Saml. Lapsly and served in the company commanded by captain Samuel Lapsly of the 12<sup>th</sup> Regiment Virginia line an continental establishment commanded by Colo Charles Scott, afterwards Genl. C. Scott

that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States, in the continental army, against the common enemy, until about the fall of the year 1779 when he was honorably discharged from service at Philadelphia in the state of Pennsylvania that he was in service three years and was in the battles of any destruction

and that he is in reduced circumstances and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support; and that he has lost his discharge, and has no evidence in his power, of his services and discharge, other than that which is here transmitted.

Reference is made to your request for information relative to John Martin of Henry County, Kentucky in 1849.

The Revolutionary War records in this office fail to afford any information in regard to a John Martin of Henry County, Kentucky.

You are furnished herewith the Revolutionary War record of John Martin, who applied for pension, while residing in Clark County, Kentucky. The data were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S. 38074, based upon his service in that war.

The date and place of birth of John Martin are not shown in the claim, nor are the names of his parents given.

He enlisted in Augusta County, Virginia, in the fall of 1776, served as a private in Colonel Charles Scott's Virginia Regiment and in Captain Samuel Lapsley's company in Colonel Nathaniel Gray's regiment, and was discharged in the fall of 1778 at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 4, 1818, at which time he was aged fifty-seven years and a resident of Clark County, Kentucky. He was

residing in same county in 1830 and then referred to his wife, aged about sixty years, to a single daughter, aged nineteen years, and to a son, aged sixteen years, but he did not give their names.

There are no further data in this claim relative to the family of John Martin.

## Missouri Women In History

Mary Alicia Owen

Mary Alicia Owen, writer, folklorist and ethnologist, was born in St. Joseph, Missouri, January 29, 1858, the daughter of James Alfred Owen and Agnes Jeanette Cargill Owen. Educated at private schools and a student at Vassar College 1868-1869, she began her literary career by contributing a column on old settlers to the St. Joseph *Saturday Democrat*. Many of her early stories were published in *Century* and *Overland Monthly* under the pseudonym of Julia Abbott.

From childhood, Mary Alicia was interested in folk tales which she heard from the people of different races who had settled in the river town of St. Joseph, including Negroes, Indians and French-Canadians. After reading a book of Indian legends by Charles Godfrey Leland, she corresponded with the author and sent him samples of folklore which she had written. Leland suggested that she publish her work. With Mr. and Mrs. Leland, she went to London in 1892 where she read a paper on Voodoo tales before the International Folklore Congress. Her paper was so well received that she readily found a British publisher for her first book, entitled *Voodoo Tales, As Told Among the Negroes of the Southwest*. Published in 1893, five years later the book was reprinted in America with the title *Ole Rabbit's Plantation Stories*. Her sister, Juliette A. Owen, and Louis Wain illustrated the book. In 1892 she was admitted to tribal membership with the Sac Indians, joined their secret societies and wrote about their beliefs and customs. Among her other published works were *Folklore of the Musquakie Indians*, *The Daughter of Alouette* and *An Ozark Gypsy* and *Oracles and Witches*.

She was an honorary member of the English Folklore Society, councilor and life member of the American Folklore Society and president of the Missouri Folklore Society from 1908 until her death in 1935. In 1940, Dr. H. M. Belden, editor of the University of Missouri Study, *Ballads and Songs*, dedicated the volume to the Missouri Folklore Society and to the memory of Mary Alicia Owen. Her article entitled "Social Customs and Usages in Missouri During the Last Century" was published in the October 1920, issue of the *MISSOURI HISTORICAL REVIEW*. She was the first individual life member of the State Historical Society of Missouri. For many years her biography was included in the *British Who's Who* and in *Who's Who in America*. She made friends with the people whose tales she recorded in their own vernacular. At her funeral in St. Joseph, January 2, 1935, six Negro men served as active pallbearers while the honorary pallbearers were men of civic and social prominence.

LAST OF THE "FATHERS"

Of all those Missourians who assembled at St. Louis in 1820 and drafted the first constitution of this State, it fell to the lot of Hiram H. Baber to become the last surviving member of that pioneer convention. Had he lived but two years longer than 1873, the year of his death, it might have been said of him that his life spanned the constitutional history of the State, for the present constitution of Missouri was adopted in 1875. *The Missouri Historical Review*

As the last of the original "Fathers" of the State, Baber's biography is not without interest. He was born in Buckingham county, Virginia, on September 10, 1795, but was reared and educated in Kentucky. He came to Missouri in May, 1815, and for a time lived at Ste. Genevieve, later moving to St. Louis. In the spring of 1817 he moved to St. Charles, from which county he was elected a delegate to the first constitutional convention. Baber was twenty-five years old at the time. *Vol 28 p. 300 #4, July 1934*

From St. Charles, Baber moved to Callaway county in the fall of 1823 and to Jefferson City in 1825, where he made his home until his death on October 23, 1873.

Baber held a number of offices in Missouri. He was deputy United States Marshal in 1820; Auditor of Public Accounts for Missouri, 1837-1845; appointed United States Marshal in 1852; appointed county judge of Cole county in 1866, and re-elected to the latter position at the next election.

ELIGIBILITY CLAUSE

"Any woman is eligible for membership in the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution who is not less than eighteen years of age, and who is descended from a man or woman who, with unflinching loyalty to the cause of American Independence, served as a sailor, or as a soldier or civil officer in one of the several Colonies or States, or in the United Colonies or States, or as a recognized patriot, or rendered material aid thereto; provided the applicant is personally acceptable to the Society." (Constitution, Article III, Section 1.)

\*Marriage in every instance in this paper means legal and lawful marriage. Date of marriage may be substituted for dates of birth and death where such date proves the soldier to have been living during the Revolution and of a suitable age for service.
