**Dispatch of Business.**—A Mr. B. **IRELAND.**

The duke of Rutland, lord Powis, & the marquis of Wellesley have declined successively the lord lieutenancy of Ireland. Indeed, says the Morning Chronicle, from the situation to which that unfortunate country has been re-

duced, we are not surprised that its administration should go a begging, and be vested substantially in the hands of half a dozen clerks.

A new survey of the royal buildings was ordered in England, and there was much animadversion on the supposed intention of building a most magnificent palace for the prince regent. Before the administration set about so great an expenditure of money, the opposition papers entreat them to look at the number of poor, the parish rates, and the unprecedented taxes.—*COLUMBIAN.*

The conduct of Ferdinand 7th of Spain towards the *liberales* is stated to be not so generous as was expected from the clemency promised. Argueñas had been condemned to serve ten years as a private soldier in the regiment of Ceuta; and Coxo to the galleys for life.

The pope was seriously indisposed, in Italy. He had inflicted upon himself a severe penance, as a punishment for his acts of condescension to Bonaparte, during his pontificate.

Transports with 6 or 700 men, had sailed from England for St. Helena. A British frigate had arrived in England, with a million and a half of dollars, and specie was so plenty there, that dollars had been sold at 96 cents a piece.

A man calling himself a son of Louis XVI, is committed to a house for lunatics in France, as insane.

General Blair is arrested and imprisoned in the Abbaye.

Generals Drouet, Debelle, and Cambronus, who are expected to be soon put on their trials, have been for some days closely confined (*au secret.*)

Several persons, some of whom were warm partisans of the usurper, during the *interregnum* were arrested yesterday in the Fauxborough St. Marceau, and delivered by the armed force to the competent authorities.

Some persons have been arrested, on a charge of attempting to seduce two grenadiers of the guard.

General Pere, who is on the first list of the ordonnance of the 20th July was arrested yesterday in Paris.

The government of England has given up gen. Cambronne to the vengeance of the Bourbons. This perfidious act borrows a deeper dye from the bravery and exalted rank of that officer. He commanded the French imperial guard at the battle of Waterloo; when he was surrounded with a part of his corps. On being required to surrender themselves prisoners of war, he replied that the imperial guards knew how to die but not to surrender. He was soon after shot through the body, taken prisoner and carried to England. As soon as he recovered from his wounds, his "most generous enemy" dooms him (in all probability) to the scaffold, there to expiate his fidelity to France, and his heroism at Mount St. John! When liberty and philosophy crossed the Atlantic or the Channel, honor seems to have fled from England also. It is pretty evident, from the part played by England in the murder of so many eminent French officers, that her object in preserving Bonaparte's life is the exaction of a more passive compliance from the Bourbons.—*Columbian.*

**Indian Ambassador in London.**

Under this head, the Dublin Evening Post of Dec. last, republishes a paragraph from an English paper, stating that a Creek ambassador was in London, the representative of 24 tribes; but that he was not openly received by the ministry. Be that as it may—has not the renewed hostility of the Creek Indians some connexion with this London agency?

**DOWNINGTOWN, (PENN.) MARCH 13.**

It is reported, that a SILVER MINE has been discovered on the land of Simon Meredito, in Pughtown, Coventry township, in this county, that yields one ounce of pure silver to a pound of ore—that it is easily obtained and appears to be inexhaustible.
